Dependent Resurvey, Portion of S. Bdy., T. 25 S., R. 5 W.

CHAINS

A fir, 25 ins. diam., bears N.  $11^{\circ}$  W., 65 lks. dist., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S35 T25S R5W BT, on a double blaze.

A fir, 11 ins. diam., bears S.  $80\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  W., 57 lks. dist., mkd.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S2 T26S R5W BT, on a double blaze.

At the corner point

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked

Deposit the steel shaft alongside the iron post.

N.  $89^{\circ}$  51' W., between secs. 2 and 35.

Ascend 150 ft. over SE. slope, through scattering timber and light undergrowth, through a recent burn.

- 6.90 Spur, slopes S.; desc. 125 ft. over W. slope, changing to SW. slope.
- 14.50 Spur, slopes S.; desc. 85 ft. over W. slope.
- 19.35 Creek, 1 lk. wide, course S.; asc. 180 ft. over SE. slope.
- 28.60 Ridge, bears SW. and NE., curving to E.; desc. 375 ft. over NW. slope.
- 39.00 Old logging road, 15 lks. wide, bears NE. and S.  $20^{\circ}$  W.
- 40.04 Point for the cor. of secs. 2, 3, 34, and 35, at proportionate distance; there is no remaining evidence of the original corner.
- Set an iron post, 28 ins. long,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears N.  $35\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$  E., 228 lks. dist., mkd. T25S R5W S35 BT.

A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears S.  $46^{\circ}$  E., 223 lks. dist., mkd. T26S R5W S2 BT.

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears S.  $84^{\circ}$  W., 447 lks. dist., mkd. T26S R5W S3 BT.

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears N.  $57^{\circ}$  W., 529 lks. dist., mkd. T25S R5W S34 BT.

From this point the cor. of Tps. 25 and 26 S., Rs. 5 and 6 W., bears N.  $89^{\circ}$  51' W., 323.58 chs. dist., determined at the intersection of old wire fences which extend N. and W., at the SE. corner of an old orchard, from which bearing trees marked by James Byron, Deputy County
