416 lks. dist., with scribe marks ¼ S35 CS BT  
visible on unhealed double blaze.

A sawed cedar stump, 24 ins. diam., bears  
N 68° W., 90 lks. dist., mkd. ¼ S34 CS BT.

No new bearing tree available within limits.

The cor. of secs. 26, 27, 34, and 35, perpetuated and  
recorded by J. W. Byron, Deputy County Surveyor, in  
1959, monumented with an iron pipe, 1 in. diam., firmly  
set, extending 14 ins. above the ground, with brass cap mkd.

A sawed fir stump, 25 ins. diam., bears  
N. 14°W., 42 lks. dist., with scribe marks  
BT visible on opened blaze.

and bearing trees marked by Byron

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears N. 61¼°E., 134 lks.  
dist., with healed double blaze.

A maple, 14 ins. diam., bears S. 57° E., 44½ lks.  
dist., with scribe marks S35 CS visible on  
partly healed blaze.

A white fir, 9 ins. diam., bears S. 57°W., 36 lks.  
dist., with healed double blaze.

A white fir, 13 ins. diam., bears N. 82°W.,  
69½ lks. dist., with healed double blaze.

Add marks ELM 1966 to brass cap.

The ¼ sec. cor. of secs. 26 and 35, perpetuated and recorded  
by J. W. Cole, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1920, determined  
from the original NE. bearing tree which is no longer in  
existence, subsequently remonumented by H. E. Crowder, in 1951,
