

Subdivision of Sec. 33, T. 29 S., R. 3 W.

CHAINS	
	N. 30° E. and S. 30° W.
12.87	Wire fence, bears N. 30°E. and S. 30° W., enter creek bottom and cultivated field; desc. 5 ft. over creek bottom.
17.50	Leave cultivated field at cut bank of Days Creek, edge bears E., curving to NE., and W.; desc. 7 ft. over rocky creek bottom.
18.65	DaysCreek, in a bend, 15 lks. wide, course W. from N.; asc. 1 ft. along creek.
19.96	Point for the SW 1/16 sec. cor. of sec. 33, at intersection with the E. and W. center line of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$. The corner point falls in the W. edge of Days Creek where it is impracticable to establish a permanent monument. From this point a witness corner bears N. 89° 50' W., 1.00 chs. dist., hereinafter described. Continue along creek.
20.10	Same creek, 10 lks. wide, course SE. curving to S.; asc. 1 ft. along rocky creek bottom.
23.00	Same creek, 10 lks. wide, course SW., curving to S.; asc. 10 ft. over creek bank.
23.90	Cut bank of Days Creek, bears W., curving to S., and E., curving to NE.; asc. 30 ft. over SE. slope, through open pasture.
29.15	Wire fence, bears NE. and SW.
29.25	Power and telephone line, bears N. 50°E. and S. 50° W.
34.55	Irrigation ditch, 3 lks. wide, course S. 15°W.; asc. 10 ft. over SE. slope, through young timber and moderate undergrowth.
40.01	The center W 1/16 sec. cor. of sec. 33. <hr/>
	From the center S 1/16 sec. cor. of sec. 33. N. 89° 50' W., on the E. and W. center line of the SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of sec. 33. Descend 60 ft. over steep NW. slope, through scattering timber and dense undergrowth.
1.60	Wet ravine, drains S. 70° W.; desc. 115 ft. along S. slope, changing to W. slope.
6.80	Abandoned dirt road, 15 lks. wide, bears N. 40° W. and S. 35° E.
9.30	Dry bed of creek, 6 lks. wide, course N. 20°W.; asc. 45 ft. over NE. slope.
12.65	Top of ascent, slopes N.; desc. 50 ft. over NW. slope.
15.00	Days Creek Road, asphaltic surface, 30 lks. wide, bears N. 40° E., curving to E., and S. 30°W.
15.58	Corner of wire fences extending N. 40° E., S. 30° W., and N. 40° W.; enter creek bottom and cultivated field.
