Dependent Resurvey, Portion of Subdivisional Lines, T. 21 S., R. 9 W.

CHAINS

A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears N. 53° W., 42 lks. dist., mkd. T21S R9W S2 BT.

Land, mountainous.
Soil, sandy clay loam.
Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, maple, and alder; undergrowth, arrow-wood, vine maple, huckleberry, thimbleberry, hazel, Oregon grape, salal, and fern.

S. 89° 53' E., bet. secs. 1 and 12.

Ascend 160 ft. along broken S. slope, across logged and burned area; through scattering undergrowth.

17.00 Top of ascent, slopes S.; desc. 15 ft. over SE. slope.

20.40 Ravine, drains S.; asc. 275 ft. over SW. slope.

40.00 The $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 1 and 12, determined at record bearing and distance from the only remaining original bearing tree:

A rotted hemlock stump, 34 ins. diam., bears N. 26° E., 13 lks. dist., with scribe marks $\frac{1}{4}$ S visible on decayed blaze.

At the corner point

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked

A fir, 12 ins. diam., bears N. 52° E., 14 lks. dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S1 BT.

A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 47° W., 30 lks. dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S12 BT.

S. 87° 50'E., beginning new measurement.

Ascend 435 ft. over broken SW. slope.

21.85 Dirt road, 25 lks. wide, bears N. and S.

26.15 Scare Ridge, bears N. and S.; desc. 370 ft. over broken NE. slope.

42.41 The closing cor. of secs. 1 and 12, on the W. bdy. of sec. 7, T. 21 S., R. 8 W., hereinbefore described.

From this point the cor. of secs. 6 and 7 only, T. 21 S., R. 8 W., bears N. 0° 16' E., 1.37 chs. dist.

Land, mountainous.
Soil, rocky clay loam.
Timber, fir, hemlock, maple, alder, and willow; undergrowth, arrow-wood, vine maple, salmonberry, thimbleberry, huckleberry, salal and fern.

From the cor of sec. 1, 2, 11, and 12.

N. 1° 33' E., bet. secs. 1 and 2.

Ascend 120 ft. over SW. slope, through heavy timber and dense burned undergrowth.
