Dependent Resurvey, Portion of Subdivisional Lines, T. 21 S., R. 9 W.

CHAINS

From the cor. of secs. 20, 21, 28, and 29.

N. 89° 14' W., bet. secs. 20 and 29.

Ascend 90 ft. over SE. slope, across logged area, through dense undergrowth.

6.80 Spur, slopes S.; desc. 40 ft. over SW. slope.

9.00(?) Ravine, drains S. 10° W: asc. 125 ft. over SE. slope.

14.90 Gravelled road, 30 lks. wide, bears N. 10° E. and S. 10° W.

16.60 Spur, slopes S.; desc. 250 ft. over SW. slope.

27.55 Ravine drains S.; asc. 170 ft. over SE. slope.

40.11 The $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of secs. 20 and 29, determined at record bearing and distance from the original bearing trees:

A rotted hemlock stump, 22 ins. diam., bears
N. 18° E., 38 lks. dist., with scribe marks
BT visible on opened blaze.

The root hole of a fallen fir, 60 ins. diam.,
bears S. 10° W., 41 lks. dist., with healed
blaze.

At the corner point

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, with brass cap marked

An alder, 5 ins. diam., bears N. 60° E., 30 lks.
dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S20 BT.

A hemlock, 6 ins. diam., bears S. 71° W., 63 lks.
dist., mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S29 BT.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, sandy clay loam.

Timber, scattering fir, hemlock, maple, and alder; undergrowth,
huckleberry, salmonberry, thimbleberry, hazel, arrowwood,
wild rose, vine maple, Oregon grape, salal, and fern.

From the cor. of secs. 5 and 6 only, on the N. bdy. of
sec. 7, determined at record bearing and distance from the
original bearing trees:

A fir snag, 55 ins. diam., bears N. 36° E.,
102 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A rotted fir stump, 40 ins. diam., bears
S. 52° E., 55 lks. dist., with no marks remaining.

A fir snag, 34 ins. diam., bears S. 46 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° W.,
93 lks. dist., with scribe marks S T21 R9
visible on open blaze.

A fir snag, 50 ins. diam., bears N. 24° W.,
78 lks. dist., with no marks visible.
