

County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

Dependent Resurvey, Portion of Subdivisional Lines, T. 26 S., R. 7 W.

CHAINS

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins. diam., 14 ins. in the ground, and in a mound of stone, 3 ft. base, to top, with brass cap mkd.

A fir, 16 ins. diam., bears N. $78\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ E., $54\frac{1}{2}$ lks. dist., mkd. T26S R7W S4 BT.

A cedar, 7 ins. diam., bears S. $78\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ E. 40 lks. dist., mkd. T26S R7W S9 BT.

A cedar, 11 ins. diam., bears S. 72° W., $41\frac{1}{2}$ lks. dist., mkd. T26S R7W S8 BT.

From this point, the cor. of secs. 4, 5, 8, and 9, established by Hathorn in 1855, bears N. 17° W., 0.195 chs. dist., determined at record bearing and distance from the remaining original bearing tree and object.

A decayed fir stump, 4 ins. diam., bears S. 55° W., 3 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on rotted blaze.

A circular rock, 25 feet diam, 8 ft. high, bears N. 55° W., 7 lks. dist., mkd. with a cross (X) on the side facing the corner.

The 1855 Hathorn corner is superseded by the 1881 Flint corner.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay.

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, madrone, alder, ample, yew, and chinquapin; undergrowth, young timber, fern, salal, poison oak, Oregon grape, hazel, arrowwood, huckleberry, wild rose, and salmonberry.

From the cor. of secs. 3, 4, 9, and 10.

S. $89^\circ 57'$ W., bet. secs. 4 and 9.

Descent 105 ft. over NW. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth, along S. edge of logged area.

- 0.75 Dirt road, 12 lks. wide, bears N. and S.
- 11.95 Creek, 7 lks. wide, course N. ; asc. 20 ft. over E. slope.
- 12.80 Spur, slopes N.; desc. 15 ft. over NW. slope.
- 14.30 Creek, 5 lks. wide, course N.; asc. 100 ft. over broken SE. slope.
- 19.76 From this point a locally established cor. of which I have no record, bears North, 0.015 chs. dist., monumented with a wooden post, 2 ins. diam., protruding 3 ft. above the ground, loosely set, from which local bearing trees:
- A Madrone, 30 ins. diam., bears N. 35° E., $14\frac{1}{2}$ lks. dist., with scribe marks 1/16 S4 BT visible on partially healed blaze.
