Dependent Resurvey, Portion of N. Bdy., T. 23 S., R. 1 W.

CHAINS

- 67.65 Creek, 5 lks. wide, course N. 30° W.; desc. 60 ft. along broken N. slope.
- 73.45 Dahl Creek, 6 lks. wide, course S. 80° W.; desc. 30 ft. over SW. slope along creek bank.
- 76.00 Same creek, 6 lks. wide, course N. 70° W.; asc. 5 ft. over NE. slope
- 79.04 The cor. of secs. 5, 6, 31, and 32, monumented with the original basalt stone, 14 x 7 x 6 ins., firmly set, 4 ins. in the ground, marked with 5 notches on the E., and 1 notch on the W. edge, alongside of which is an iron pipe, 1½ ins. diam., firmly set, projecting 22 ins. above ground, from which the remains of the original bearing trees:

A root hole bears S. 20½° E., 51 lks. dist., with a down hemlock alongside, 33 ins. diam., with scribe marks BT visible on partially healed blaze.

A cedar, 19 ins. diam., bears S. 71½° W., 49 lks. dist., with scribe marks 2W BT visible on partially healed blaze.

A cedar, 20 ins. diam., bears N. 13° W., 47 lks. dist., with scribe marks 22S R1 S3 BT visible on partially healed blaze. (Record, N. 14½° W., 49 lks.)

At the corner point

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, 2½ ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

A cedar, 28 ins. diam., bears N. 14½° E., 55½ lks. dist., mkd. T22S R1W S32 BT.

A yew, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 66 ¾° E., 97 lks. dist., mkd. T23S R1W. S5 BT.

Deposit the corner stone and reset the iron pipe alongside the iron post.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay.

Timber, fir, cedar, hemlock, alder, maple, yew, cascara, madrone, dogwood, chinquapin, pine, and oak; undergrowth, vine maple, rhododendron, hazel, arrowwood, poison oak, huckleberry, blackberry, salal, Oregon grape, wild rose, sword and bracken fern.
