T. 31 S., R. 8 W., Willamette Meridian, Oregon.

**CHAINS**

A hemlock, 10 ins. diam., bears N. 3 1/2° W., 48 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on partially healed blaze.

A hemlock, 12 ins. diam., bears S. 18° W., 17 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on partially healed blaze.

S. 85° 37' W., bet. secs. 5 and 8.

Ascend 125 ft. over NE. slope, along N. edge of timber, and light undergrowth.

6.10 Spur, slopes N. 20° W.; desc. 150 ft. over W. slope.

12.10 Ravine, drains N. 05° W.; asc. 590 ft. over NE. slope.

20.50 Enter heavy timber and moderate undergrowth, edge bears N. and S.

40.52 The cor. of secs. 5, 6, 7, and 8.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay.

Timber, fir, hemlock, oak, madrone, chinquapin, cedar, and pine; undergrowth, salal, huckleberry, salmonberry, live oak, hazel, rhododendron, ferns, and vine maple.

S. 88° 32' W., bet. secs. 6 and 7.

Descend 310 ft. over NW. slope, through heavy timber and moderate undergrowth.

14.40 Creek, 1 lk. wide course N. 05° W.; asc. 185 ft. over NE. slope.

26.00 Spur, slopes N. 33° E.; desc. 140 ft. over NW. slope.

40.06 The 1/4 sec. cor. of secs. 6 and 7, perpetuated and recorded by John M. Powell, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1968, monumented with iron pipe, 1 in. diam., firmly set, protruding 10 ins. above ground, with the original basalt stone alongside, 18 x 12 x 10 ins., firmly set, 10 ins. in the ground, mkd. 1/4 on N. face, with brass cap mkd.

A fir stump, 75 ins. diam., bears S. 10° W., 38 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on bark blaze.

A white fir, 8 ins. diam., bears N. 09° W., 14 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on partially healed blaze.

A white fir, 10 in. diam., bears S. 75° W., 35 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on partially healed blaze.
