

# County Surveyor's Record, Douglas County, Oregon

1949

Dependent Resurvey, Portion of E. Bdy., T. 25 S., R 7 W.

CHAINS

From the  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of secs. 1 and 6, on the E. bdy. of the Tp., perpetuated and recorded by the County Surveyor in 1963, monumented with an iron post, 1 in. diam., protruding 7 ins. above the ground, firmly set, with brass cap mkd.

from which the original bearing trees:

A rotted fir stump, 36 ins. diam., bears S. 38° E., 64 lks. dist., with scribe marks S B visible on rotted blaze.

A fir, 32 ins. diam., bears S. 58 $\frac{1}{2}$ ° W., 109 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on open blaze. (Record, S. 67° W.)

and bearing trees mkd. by the County Surveyors Office in 1963

A fir, 6 ins. diam., bears N. 76° E., 32 $\frac{1}{2}$  lks. dist., with scribe marks  $\frac{1}{4}$  S6 CS BT visible on open double blaze.

A fir, 6 ins. diam., bears S. 26 $\frac{1}{4}$ ° E., 18 $\frac{1}{2}$  lks. dist., with scribe marks  $\frac{1}{4}$  S6 CS BT visible on open double blaze.

This monument is erroneously mkd. and is actually common to both secs. 1 and 6.

N. 3° 44' W., bet. secs. 1 and 6.

Descend 120 ft. along W. slope, changing to NW. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.

19.60 Bottom of descent, slopes W.; asc. 25 ft. over SW. slope.

33.75 Top of ascent, slopes W.; desc. 30 ft. over NW. slope.

36.75 Bottom of descent, slopes W.; asc. 50 ft. over SW. slope.

40.50 Top of ascent, slopes W.; desc. 70 ft. over broken NW. slope.

46.37 The cor. of Tps. 24 and 25 S., R. 6 W., described in field notes of a dependent resurvey in T. 24 S., R 6 W., under this Group.

N. 0° 19' E., beginning new measurement.

Ascend slightly over SW. slope.

0.17 Point for the closing cor. of Tps. 24 and 25 S., R. 7 W., hereinafter described.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay with rock outcroppings.

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, madrone, yew, chinquapin, dogwood, alder, and maple; undergrowth, young timber, fern, salal, vine maple, poison oak, Oregon grape, hazel, arrowwood, huckleberry, and salmonberry.
