Dependent Resurvey, Portion of Subdivisional Lines, T. 25 S., R. 7 W.

CHAINS

A Fir, 39 ins. diam., bears N. 27° E., 16½ lks.  
dist., mkd. X at breast height and BT at base.

A fir, 28 ins. diam., bears S. 43½° W., 31 lks.  
dist., mkd. X at breast height and BT at base.

Ascend 105 ft. over S. slope and bluff.

64.20 Foot of rock bluff, bears E. and W.

66.00 Top of rock bluff, bears E. and W.; asc. 70 ft. over SE.  
slope.

71.75 Spur, slopes E.; desc. 165 ft. over NE. slope.

77.30 Dirt road, 15 lks. wide, bears N. 80° W. and S. 80° E.

79.82 The cor. of secs. 9, 10, 15, and 16, monumented with an  
iron post, 2½ ins. diam., protruding 4 ins. above the  
ground, firmly set, with brass cap mkd.

alongside, with scribe marks S16 BT visible

A fir, 49 ins. diam., bears N. 2° W., 60 lks.  
dist., with scribe marks S9 BT visible on  
bark blaze.

locally established bearing trees reported by Zirpel,  
Cadastral Surveyor, in 1958,

A fir, 40 ins. diam., bears N. 71¼° E., 51½  
lks. dist., with scribe marks T25S R7W S10  
BT visible on bark blaze.

A fir snag, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 80¼° E.,  
51½ lks. dist., with scribe marks S15 BT  
visible on open blaze. (Record, N. 80¼° E.)

and a bearing tree mkd. by Zirpel in 1958

A white fir snag, 12 ins. diam., bears S. 8¼° E.,  
114 lks. dist., with scribe marks T25S R7W  
S15 BT visible on open blaze.

add new bearing trees

A white fir, 20 ins. diam., bears S. 70¼° E.,  
113 lks. dist., mkd. T25S R7W S15 BT.

A cedar, 15 ins. diam., bears S. 60½° W.,  
73 lks. dist., mkd. T25S R7W S16 BT.

Land, mountainous except for narrow river valley.  
Soil, rocky clay.  
Timber, fir, oak, cedar, hemlock, madrone, maple, alder,  
chinquapin, ash, willow, and myrtle; undergrowth, young  
timber, fern salal, poison oak, vine maple, Oregon  
grape, blackberry, and nettle.
