A maple, 21 ins. diam., bears N. 38° W., 15 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A fir snag, 17 ins. diam., bears N. 27° E., 100 lks. dist., with healed double blaze.

A sawed fir stump, 15 ins. diam., bears S. 53 1/2° E., 46 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The lands intownship 25 south, range 7 west, covered in this resurvey, are located about 9 miles westerly of Sutherlin, Oregon. Access into the area is by way of Tyee Road which runs along the Umpqua River, Hubbard Creek Road, and a paved county road extending northerly from the small town of Melrose, Oregon. Numerous gravelled and dirt roads branch from these roads and lead into the area resurveyed.
