True point for the cor. of secs. 7, 12, 13, and 18, perpetuated and recorded by the County Surveyor, in 1957, when evidence of the original corner was still in existence, falls in Milton Creek, 8 lks. wide, course N. 50° W., where it is impracticable to establish a permanent monument.

From this point, a local witness cor. established by the County Surveyor, bears East, 0.15 chs. dist., monumented with an iron post, 1 1/2 ins. diam., firmly set projecting 8 ins. above ground, with top mkd. COUNTY SURVEYOR'S OFFICE W. C. 10' WEST TO T28S R5W R4W S7 S12 S13 S18 1957, from which bearing trees mkd. by the County Surveyors.

A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 56 1/2° W., 206 lks. dist., with scribe marks WC T28S visible on open blaze.

A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears N. 84 1/2° W., 207 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay loam.

Timber, fir, cedar, maple, oak, pine, and madrone; undergrowth, salal, blackberry, poison oak, hazel, arrowwood, and fern.

A fir snag, 13 ins. diam., bears N. 34 1/2° E., 7 lks. dist., with scribe marks S17 T28S R4W BT visible on opened blaze.

A fir, 13 ins. diam., bears S. 13° W., 14 1/2 lks. dist., with scribe marks BT visible on bark.

A fir snag, 35 ins. diam., bears N. 41° W., 18 1/4 lks. dist., with scribe marks S18 28S R4W BT visible on bark.

A fir, 20 ins. diam., bears N. 87° E., 12 3/4 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on open blaze.
