Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay.

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, madrone, and maple; under-
growth, salal, manzanita, poison oak, ceanothus, black-
berry, hazel, arrowwood, and fern.

From the 1/4 sec. cor. of secs. 8 and 17, determined by the
County Surveyor, in 1961, at the intersection of the
bearings from the faces of two bearing trees of no re-
cord. The bark scribing on these trees bear the same
characteristics of those found on positively identified
corners of the original survey in the township. The
corner point is monumented with an iron post, 1 in.
diam., firmly set, projecting 12 ins. above ground, with
brass cap mkd.
