

Dependent Resurvey of a Portion of the South Boundary,
T. 29 S., R. 8 W., Willamette Meridian, Oregon

MAINS

from which the remains of the original bearing trees

A root hole, bears N. 80° E., 21 lks. dist., with a down fir alongside, 40 ins. diam., with healed blaze.

A fir, 27 ins. diam., bears S. 43° E., 46 lks. dist., with scribe marks T30S R8W S2 CS BT visible on bark blaze, as rescribed by the County Surveyor, in 1970.

A root hole, bears S. 55° W., 6 lks. dist., with a down fir alongside, 30 ins. diam., with healed blaze.

A root hole, bears N. 30° W., 13 lks. dist., with a down cedar alongside, 15 ins. diam., no marks visible.

and bearing trees mkd. by the County Surveyor

A white fir, 8 ins. diam., bears N. 39½° E., 31½ lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on open blaze.

A fir, 29 ins. diam., bears N. 30° W., 29½ lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on open blaze.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay.

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, oak, maple, madrone, chinquapin, myrtle, and alder; undergrowth, vine maple, salal, Oregon grape, hazel, poison oak, and fern.

From the ¼ sec. cor. of secs. 7 and 12, on the W. bdy. of the Tp., perpetuated and recorded by Ben B. Irving, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1927, from original evidence no longer in existence, subsequently perpetuated and recorded by James W. Byron, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1958, determined from the remains of bearing trees mkd. by Irving:

A sawed fir stump, 30 ins. diam., bears S. 65° W., 109 lks. dist., with scribe mark B visible on opened blaze.

and bearing trees mkd. by Byron

A cedar, 15 ins. diam., bears S. 32° E., 104½ lks. dist., with scribe marks ¼ S7 CS BT visible on partially healed double blaze.

A fir, 8 ins. diam., bears S. 72° W., 95½ lks. dist., with healed blaze.
