A sugar pine, 28 ins. diam., bears N. 25° E., 8 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A sugar pine, 24 ins. diam., bears S. 48° E., 82 lks. dist., no marks visible on opened blaze.

A sugar pine, 11 ins. diam., bears N. 46° E., 75½ lks. dist., with scribe marks T30S R8W S20 CS BT visible on partially healed blaze.

A chinquapin, 7 ins. diam., bears S. 60° E., 33½ lks. dist., with scribe marks T30S R8W S29 CS BT visible on partially healed blaze.

A chinquapin, 6 ins. diam., bears S. 22° W., 21 lks. dist., with scribe marks S30 CS BT visible on partially healed blaze.

A fir, 17 ins. diam., bears N. 83° W., 30½ lks. dist., with healed blaze.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay loam.

Timber, fir, cedar, yew, pine, hemlock, madrone, maple, chinquapin, and alder; undergrowth, vine maple, manzanita, salal, arrowwood, hazel, huckleberry, blackberry, poison oak, Oregon grape, and fern.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The lands in township 30 south, range 8 west, covered in this resurvey, are located about 7 miles southerly from the small town of Camas Valley, Oregon. Access into the area is by way of a paved road extending southerly from Camas Valley, and various dirt and gravelled roads branching from it.

Elevations range from about 1,450 feet above sea level at the corner of sections 19, 20, 29, and 30, to about 2,300 feet above sea level at the corner of sections 29, 30, 31, and 32. The area is drained by numerous small creeks flowing generally northerly into Boulder Creek.

Timber in the area consists primarily of fir, cedar, hemlock, and yew, with stands of pine, maple, madrone, chinquapin, and alder; undergrowth is chiefly salal, vine maple, Oregon grape, hazel, poison oak, manzanita, huckleberry, and fern.

No mining is being carried on and no mineral deposits were noted along the lines resurveyed. There are no permanent residents in the area.
