39.85	<p>The cor. of secs. 12 and 13, perpetuated and recorded by James W. Byron, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1962, monumented with the original basalt stone, 18 x 7 x 5 ins., firmly set, projecting 4 ins. above ground, mkd. with 2 grooves on N. and S. faces, from which the remains of the original bearing trees:</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">A fir, 23 ins. diam., bears S. 50° E., 19 lks. dist., with healed blaze.</p> <p>and the remains of bearing trees mkd. by Strickler</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">A fir snag, 18 ins. diam., bears S. 55° W., 35 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on open blaze.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">A root crown, bears N. 68½° W., 47 lks. dist., with a down fir alongside, size indeterminate, with fragmentary scribe marks visible on open and decayed blaze.</p> <p>and bearing trees mkd. by Byron</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">A fir, 10 ins. diam., bears S. 56° W., 64½ lks. dist., with healed double blaze.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">A fir, 9 ins. diam., bears N. 75° W., 44 lks. dist., with healed double blaze.</p> <p>At the corner point</p> <p>Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, 2½ ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">T 29 S T 29 S S 12 R 2 W S 13 R 3 W S 18 1976</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Deposit corner stone alongside iron post.</p> <p>Land, mountainous. Soil, clay loam. Timber, fir, cedar, madrone, hemlock, alder, and maple; undergrowth, hazel, arrowwood, poison oak, Oregon grape, salal, and fern.</p>
