

Dependent Resurvey, Portion of Subdivisional Lines,
T. 29 S., R. 4 W., Willamette Meridian, Oregon

CHAINS

From this point, a local corner established by John H. Markham, Jr., Registered Engineer No. 2880, in 1964, bears N. 89° 18' E., 2.11 chs. dist., monumented with a madrone, 40 ins. diam., with scribe marks T29S R4W S15 S16 S21 S22 visible on bark, with an iron pipe, 1 in. diam., firmly set, projecting 8 ins. above ground, alongside SE. edge of tree, from which bearing trees mkd. by Markham:

A fir, 12 ins. diam., bears N. 8½° E., 33½ lks. dist., with scribe marks S15 visible on partially healed upper blaze and BT visible on lower bark blaze.

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears S. 61° E., 36 lks. dist., with scribe marks S22 visible on partially healed upper blaze and BT visible on lower bark blaze.

A cedar, 12 ins. diam., bears S. 36½° W., 39 lks. dist., with scribe marks S21 visible on partially healed upper blaze and BT visible on lower bark blaze.

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears N. 45° W., 40½ lks. dist., with scribe marks S16 visible on partially healed upper blaze and BT visible on lower bark blaze.

Land, mountainous.

Soil, rocky clay loam.

Timber, fir, oak, cedar, madrone, yew, maple, dogwood, and cascara; undergrowth, fern, salal, poison oak, vine maple, Oregon grape, blackberry, thimbleberry, and hazel.

From the cor. of secs. 14, 15, 22, and 23, perpetuated and recorded by G. G. Stewart, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1922, monumented with an iron pipe, 1 in. diam., firmly set, projecting 2 ins. above ground, from which the remains of the original bearing trees:

A root hole, bears S. 45° W., 32 lks. dist.

A root hole, bears N. 35° W., 66 lks. dist.

and the remains of a bearing tree mkd. by Stewart

A burned and decayed pine stump, size indeterminate, bears N. 45° E., 145 lks. dist., no marks visible.

and bearing trees mkd. by N. E. Richardson, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1945

A fir, 18 ins. diam., bears N. 66° E., 35½ lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A madrone, 15 ins. diam., bears S. 39° E., 40 lks. dist., no marks visible.

and a bearing tree mkd. by James W. Byron, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1956

A fir, 20 ins. diam., bears N. 17½° W., 138 lks. dist., with healed blaze.
