Timber, fir, pine, cedar, oak, and madrone; undergrowth, poison oak, huckleberry, hazel, manzanita, salal, and Oregon grape.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The land included in the foregoing resurvey is located approximately 12 miles northwesterly of Glendale, Oregon. Access is by way of asphalt surfaced roads along Cow Creek and West Fork of Cow Creek, with several dirt and gravelled roads branching from them. The Southern Pacific Railroad tracks extend through the northeastern portion of the township along Cow Creek.

The area is mountainous, with elevations ranging from about 1,000 feet above sea level along West Fork of Cow Creek, to about 3,000 feet above sea level near the corner of sections 3, 4, 33, and 34, on the north boundary of the township. The main drainage is West Fork of Cow Creek, which flows easterly through the northern part of the township and empties into Cow Creek near the corner of sections 1, 2, 11, and 12. There are numerous smaller creeks which drain into the West Fork of Cow Creek.

The soil is composed generally of rocky clay. The timber consists primarily of fir, with stands of pine, cedar, oak, madrone, chinquapin, maple, and alder. The undergrowth consists chiefly of poison oak, manzanita, ceanothus, hazel, vine maple, huckleberry, salal, and Oregon grape.

There were no mineral deposits noted along the lines surveyed.

The average of several readings along the lines resurveyed gives a mean magnetic declination of 19° 30' E. There is a range of 4° due to local attraction.
