mkd. $\frac{1}{4}$ S27 BT.

Ascend 25 ft. over SE. slope.

39.55 Ridge, bears N. 80° W. and S. 80° E.; desc. 125 ft. over
NE. slope.

45.40 Ravine, drains SE.; asc. 300 ft. over SE. slope.

60.00 Spur, slopes E.; desc. 45 ft. over NE. slope.

62.50 Ravine, drains S. 60° E.; asc. 55 ft. over SE. slope.

64.95 Spur, slopes N. 20° E.; desc. 75 ft. over NE. slope.

70.15 Ravine, drains E.; asc. 240 ft. over SE. slope.

77.50 The cor. of secs. 22, 23, 26, and 27, perpetuated and re-
corded by James W. Byron, County Surveyor, in 1970,

A fir, 19 ins. diam., bears S. 55° E., $22\frac{1}{2}$ lks.
dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible
on bark blaze. (Record, 26 lks.)

A fir, 17 ins. diam., bears S. $30\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W., 65 lks.
dist., with fragmentary scribe marks visible on
partially open blaze. (Record, S. 35° W.)

A fir, 29 ins. diam., bears N. 16° W., 18 lks.
dist., with healed blaze. (Record, N. 10° W.,
16 lks.)

and a new bearing tree

A fir, 29 ins. diam., bears N. 55° E., 46 lks.
dist., mkd. T31S R8W S23 BT.
