CHAINS

A fir, 18 ins. diam., bears S. 75 1/2° W., 78 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A fir, 18 ins. diam., bears N. 40° W., 99 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

These control lines were fully retraced, and search was made for intervening corners, none of which were found.

Land, mountainous.
Soil, sandy clay loam.
Timber, fir, hemlock, ash, maple, cedar, oak, madrone, and alder; undergrowth, poison oak, vine maple, blackberry, fern, Oregon grape, thimbleberry, huckleberry, wild rose, arrowwood, hazel, and young timber.

From the cor. of secs. 22, 23, 26, and 27.

S. 89° 45' W., bet. secs. 22 and 27.

Ascend 30 ft. over nearly level open pasture land.

3.60 Woven wire fence corner, fences extending E., S. 50° E., and N. 50° W.

3.90 Williams Creek Road, gravelled, 30 lks. wide, bears N. 50° W. and S. 50° E.

4.60 Woven wire fence, extending N. 40° W. and S. 40° E.

4.80 Power line, bears N. 40° W. and S. 40° E.

6.30 Enter timber, edge bears NW. and SE.; asc. 100 ft. over NE. slope.

10.60 Spur, slopes N; desc. 55 ft. over NW. slope.

13.30 Creek, 4 lks. wide, course N. 25° E.; asc. 235 ft. over NE. slope.

23.25 Spur, slopes N; desc. 135 ft. over NW. slope.

34.15 Creek, 5 lks. wide, course N. 20° E.; asc. 170 ft. over SE. slope.

40.02 The 1/4 sec. cor. of secs. 22 and 27, perpetuated and recorded by Floyd J. Cole, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1915, from original evidence no longer in existence, further perpetuated by James W. Byron, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1958, monumented with an iron post, 1 1/4 ins. diam., firmly set, projecting 16 ins. above ground, with brass cap mkd.

An oak, 24 ins. diam., bears S. 33 1/2° E., 59 lks. dist., with healed double blaze.

A fir, 44 ins. diam., bears S. 42 1/2° W., 77 lks. dist., with healed double blaze.

A root hole, bears N. 87° W., 44 lks. dist., with a down oak alongside, 18 ins. diam., with axe marks visible on decayed blaze.
