Dependent Resurvey, Portion of Subdivisional Lines,
T. 32 S., R. 4 W., Willamette Meridian, Oregon

CHAINS

Timber, fir, cedar, pine, madrone, chinquapin, live oak, yew, alder, and hemlock; undergrowth, manzanita, ceanothus, poison oak, rhododendron, vine maple, Oregon grape, fern, and young timber.

The point for the 1/4 sec. cor. of sec. 34 only, T. 32 S., R. 4 W., is at midpoint on the S. bdy. of sec. 34.

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, 2 1/2 ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

A fir, 13 ins. diam., bears N. 24° E., 60 lks. dist., mkd. 1/4 S34 BT.

A cedar, 6 ins. diam., bears N. 5° W., 87 1/2 lks. dist., mkd. 1/4 S34 BT.

From this point, the former standard cor. of secs. 33 and 34, changed to an angle point by Chapman and Nicklin, bears N. 89° 41' W., 10.265 chs. dist., hereinbefore described.

The point for the E 1/16 sec. cor. of sec. 34 only, T. 32 S., R. 4 W., is at midpoint bet. the closing cor. of secs. 34 and 35, and the 1/4 sec. cor. of sec. 34 only, on the S. bdy. of sec. 34.

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, 2 1/2 ins. diam., 20 ins. in the ground, and in a mound of stone, 2 ft. base, to top, with brass cap mkd.

A fir, 6 ins. diam., bears N. 59° E., 57 1/2 lks. dist., mkd. E. 1/16 S34 BT.

A ponderosa pine, 6 ins. diam., bears N. 56° W., 40 lks. dist., mkd. E 1/16 S34 BT.

From this point, the former standard 1/4 sec. cor. of sec. 34, changed to an angle point by Chapman and Nicklin, bears S. 89° 41' E., 9.425 chs. dist., hereinbefore described.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The lands included in the foregoing resurvey are located in a mountainous area about 10 to 16 mile east of Glendale, Oregon. The elevation ranges from about 2650 feet above sea level on Starvout Creek on the south boundary of section 32, to about 4400 feet above sea level on Green Mountain at the 1/4 section corner of section 34 and 35. Access into the area is by way of improved roads leading up the West Fork of Evans Creek, Graves Creek, Quines Creek, and Starvout Creek drainages. These main roads branch off into numerous improved and unimproved roads leading to previously logged areas located throughout the entire locale.
