<p>GENERAL DESCRIPTION</p> <p>The lands included in the foregoing survey are located about one mile westerly of the small hamlet of Kellogg, Oregon, in Douglas County. The area is drained by Mehl Creek and its tributaries which flow in a northerly direction into the Umpqua River, and by the Umpqua River which flows in a northeasterly direction across the southeast one-quarter of section 19. A ridge traverses the section in a northeasterly direction from a point on the south boundary of the section about 10 chains east of the corner of sections 19, 24, 25, and 30. Elevations range from about 200 feet above sea level along the Umpqua River, to about 1,000 feet above sea level near the corner of sections 19, 25, 24 and 30.</p> <p>Access into the area is via Bullock Road, Mehl Creek Road, and a number of privately-owned logging roads which lead into the area.</p> <p>Soil in the area is composed of sandy loam from a few inches to several feet in depth. Most of the bottom lands along the Umpqua River and some of the higher areas are used as pasturage for sheep and cattle. Most of the private lands have been logged, with the remaining areas being forested with fir, cedar, hemlock, oak, maple, alder, ash, chinquapin, madrone, and willow. The undergrowth consists of vine maple, hazel, arrowwood, salmonberry, thimbleberry, huckleberry, blackberry, ceanothus, poison oak, Scotch broom, Oregongrape, salal, and fern.</p> <p>No evidence of mineral activity was noted in the area covered by this resurvey.</p> <p>The average of a considerable number of readings throughout the area, gives a value of 20° 00' E. for the mean magnetic declination. There is a range of 0° 30' in local attraction.</p>
