An oak, 33 ins. diam., bears N. 40° E., 52 lks. dist., with healed double blaze.

and the remains of bearing trees mkd. by Frear

A black oak, 18 ins. diam., bears N. 24° E., 72 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A sawed fir stump, 16 ins. diam., bears S. 44° W., 17 lks. dist., with scribe marks 1/4 S BT visible on opened blaze.

and a bearing tree mkd. by Byron

A fir, 14 ins. diam., bears S. 85 1/2° W., 54 lks. dist., with healed double blaze.

At the corner point

Set an iron post, 28 ins. long, 2 1/2 ins. diam., 24 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

Byron, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1963, and further perpetuated and recorded by Gary L. Langlitz, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1979, monumented with an iron post, 1 1/4 ins. diam., firmly set, projecting 10 ins. above ground, with brass cap mkd.

A fir snag, 20 ins. diam., bears S. 34 1/4° E., 52 lks. dist., with fragmentary scribe marks, made by Thiel, visible on opened blaze. I open this tree further to reveal scribe marks S14 BT on original blaze. (Record, S. 31 1/2° E., 54 lks.)

A sawed fir stump, 24 ins. diam., bears N. 49° E., 30 lks. dist., with scribe marks 4 S and a chaining notch visible on opened blaze.
