33.95 Spur, slopes South, desc. 40 ft. over SW. slope.

38.64 The cor. of secs. 3, 4, 33 and 34, on the S. bdy. of the Tp., monumented with an iron post, 2 1/2 ins. diam., firmly set, projecting 4 ins. above ground, alongside of which is a wood post, 4 ins. sq., firmly set, projecting 16 ins. above ground, with scribe marks R2W S4 on SW. and T2 S3 on SE. faces, also alongside of which is a stone, of which I have no record, 11 x 11 x 4 ins., firmly set, projecting 5 ins. above ground, mkd. with 3 grooves on the E. and W. faces, with brass cap mkd.

A fir, 45 ins. diam., bears N. 72° W., 33 lks. dist., with illegible scribe marks visible on opened blaze.

A madrone, 12 ins. diam., bears S. 78 1/2° E., 33 lks. dist., with illegible scribe marks on partially healed blaze.

A fir stump, 54 ins. diam., bears S. 78 1/2° W., 86 lks. dist., no marks visible. (Record, 76 lks.)

A madrone, 16 ins. diam., bears N. 71 3/4° E., 82 lks. dist., with illegible scribe marks visible on partially healed blaze.

A fir, 20 ins. diam., bears S. 33 1/4° E., 39 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A fir, 14 ins. diam., bears S. 31° W., 83 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

A fir, 12 ins. diam., bears N. 27 1/2° W., 30 lks. dist., with healed blaze.

Land, mountainous.

Timber, fir, hemlock, cedar, madrone, oak, maple, pine, and ash; undergrowth, hazel, Oregon grape, blackberry, fern, salal, huckleberry, arrowwood, salmonberry, poison oak, and young timber.
