GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The lands included in the foregoing survey are located approximately 11 miles southwesterly of the town of Riddle, Oregon. Access into the area is via a paved, county road extending along Cow Creek and several paved, gravelled, and dirt roads branching from it into the area.

The area is drained by Cow Creek, Dads Creek, and Table Creek, and their tributaries. The elevations range from about 900 feet above sea level near the $\frac{1}{4}$ section corner of sections 7 and 8 to approximately 1550 feet above sea level at the corner of sections 7, 8, 17, and 18.
