T31S R4W S12 BT.</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">Deposit original stone and axle alongside, and white "DEEP-1" magnetic marker at base of stainless steel post.</p> <p>Land, mountainous. Soil, rock clay. Timber, cedar, fir, yew, pine, hemlock, ash, alder, madrone, maple, and dogwood; undergrowth, salal, ferns, arrowwood, poison oak, Oregon grape, vine maple, manzanita, rhododendron, ceanothus, huckleberry, and young timber.</p>												
7.95	<p>N. 0° 46' W., bet. secs. 1 and 2.</p> <p>Ascend over SE. slope, changing to SW. slope, through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.</p> <p>Ridge, bears NW. and SE.; desc. over broken NE. slope; also gravelled road, 15 lks. wide, bears N. 75° W., N. 10° W., and SE., in intersection.</p>												
40.41	<p>The ¼ sec. cor. of secs. 1 and 2, perpetuated and recorded by John H. Markham, Jr., Registered Engineer No. 2880, in 1960, monumented with the original corner tree, a fir, 57 ins. diam., with healed blaze on W. face, from which the original bearing trees:</p> <p style="margin-left: 40px;">A maple, 14 ins. diam., bears N. 43½° E., 22 lks. dist., with axe marks visible on decayed blaze.
