A fir stump, 60 ins. diam., bears N.  $33\frac{1}{4}^\circ$  E., 79 lks. dist., with scribe marks R3 S35 BT visible on partially healed blaze.

A cedar, 30 ins. diam., bears S.  $29^\circ$  E., 7 lks. dist., with illegible scribe marks visible on weathered blaze.

A fir, 28 ins. diam., bears S.  $48\frac{1}{2}^\circ$  W., 64 lks. dist., with a healed blaze. (Record, 61 lks.)

A cedar, 15 ins. diam., bears N.  $51\frac{1}{2}^\circ$  W., 57 lks. dist., with a burned blaze.

and bearing trees mkd. by Vernon R. Tracy, Deputy County Surveyor, in 1966

A fir, 15 ins. diam., bears N.  $10^\circ$  E., 36 lks. dist., with a healed blaze.

A cedar, 25 ins. diam., bears N.  $69^\circ$  W.,  $54\frac{1}{2}$  lks. dist., with scribe marks 2 BT visible on partially healed blaze.

S.  $88^\circ 30' 00''$  W., bet. secs. 3 and 34.

Descend over SW. slope, Through heavy timber and dense undergrowth.

8.90 Dirt road, 15 lks. wide, bears N. and S.

14.70 Creek, 6 lks. wide, course S.  $50^\circ$  W.; asc. over SE. slope.

20.130 Point for the E. 1/16 sec. cor. of secs. 3 and 34.

Set a stainless steel post, 28 ins. long,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ins. diam., 22 ins. in the ground, with brass cap mkd.

A fir, 12 ins. diam. bears N.  $42^\circ$  E., 13 lks. dist., mkd. E 1/16 S34 BT.

A cedar, 7 ins. diam., bears S.  $35^\circ$  W., 7 lks. dist., mkd. E 1/16 S3 BT.

Deposit a white "DEEP-1" magnetic marker at the base of the stainless steel post.

Continue to asc. over SE. slope.

31.50 Spur, slopes SW.; desc. over NW. slope.

40.260 The  $\frac{1}{4}$  sec. cor. of secs. 3 and 34, monumented with an iron post, 1 in. diam., firmly set, projecting 6 ins. above ground, with brass cap mkd.
