Section corner for Secs. 26, 27, 34 and 35
Found - 1964 Douglas County brass cap firmly set facing South with Section numbers improperly stamped. Ren. #1
Orig. fir now 28" stump with scribing visible bears N.59°W., 5.3 ft
Orig. 42" fir now 47" with good scar bears N.58°E., 35.6 ft.
Orig. 36" fir now 39" with good scar bears S.64°W., 11.9 ft.
Orig. 36" fir now 39" with good scar bears S.7°E., 12.5 ft.
10" hemlock per Ren. #1 now 13" with good scar bears N.29°E., 90.0'
Set - Since location of found brass cap is correct but markings wrong, I reference location then reset a new 1" x 30" I.P. with brass cap at original location. Cap marked "Douglas Co Surveyor"

Found - B.L.M. BCIP mkd: 1/4 S6 T19S R9W 1958, from which:
BTs - 18" cedar bears S.53-1/2°E., 77.3-ft., w/healed face.
Up-rooted maple, record N.77-1/2°E, 76.6-ft.
New BT - 36" cedar bears S.81°E., 81.6-ft. (scribed: 1/4 S6 BT).

Closing Corner for Secs. 6, & 7 of T.19-9 on Sec. 1, T.19-10. (1963 Res.).
Found - B.L.M. BCIP mkd: T19S S6 S1 CC S7 R10W R9W 1958, from which:
BTs - 15" D.fir bears N.56°E., 71.6-ft. w/healed face (1958).
18" D.fir bears S.53°E., 76.1-ft. w/visible scribe.
16" D.fir bears S.10°W., 75.4-ft. w/visible scribe.
13" D.fir bears N.51°W., 2.3-ft. w/healed blaze.

CC at SW corner of Sec. 31, T. 19 S., R. 9 W. (Tnsp. Corner) Ren #20
CORNER REPORT ONLY.
History- This corner was originally established in 1899 by Chandler. The corner mon. was a 6" chittum - BTs were: 6" chittum N. 20° E., 40 lks., & 20" fir S. 26 3/4° E., 26 lks.
In 1921, Mensch fnd the corner & scribed a 4" chittum S. 38° E., 10 lks., as the orig. fir BT was dead.
In 1978 (see Co. Surv. file# M71-62) Forrest Hales fnd an up-rooted chittum & set a 5/8" iron rod for the closing corner mon., holding the position of the fnd chittum as the orig. northeast bearing tree.
Mon. Fd. - 5/8" I.R. (Set by Hales).
Accessories Fd. - BTs described by Hales survey:
48" D. Fir, single blazed w/scribing bears N. 32 1/2° E., 51.1 ft. (Rec. 49.0 ft.)
40" D. Fir, (Rec. 44") single blazed w/visible scribing "S6 T20S R9W BT" bears S. 50° E., 21.4 ft. (Rec. S. 53 1/2° E., 18.2 ft.)
Note - I visited this corner with Ernesto Alvarado of the Siuslaw Nat. Forest, who produced a copy (see file) of a Forest Service "CORNER RECORD" card dated 1968. According to the info. on the card, the cor. had been visited by J. Deaton & D. Thrall 10 years prior to the Hales survey. The card shows that a 16" fir stub w/scribing was located & that blazed lines ran E. & S. from the cor. position. This evidently was accepted as the Orig. fir BT reported by Mensch to be dead in 1921 (47 years earlier). Mr. Alvarado indicated that he had set a temporary stake at the Orig. bearing & dist. from a decayed fir stump (stump bears S. 26 3/4° E., 26 lks. from stake)
From the Hales 5/8" I.R. we measure to the temp. stake set by Alvarado N. 22° E., 16.9 ft., & we measure to the 30" fir stump S. 89 1/2° E., 11.3 ft. We did not find any scribing on the fir stump. We fnd. blazed line running E. & N. from the general area of the closing cor. (the blazed line to the North was East of the line mkd. by Hales).
Without performing a survey it would not be practical to distinguish if an intersection point could be determined from the found blazed lines.
Bearing Tree tags with no info. (name, date, bearings, or distances) scribed were found. One tag was found on the 48" Hales BT & faced a South Southwest direction. The other was found on a maple stump (approx. 8 ft. Easterly of Hales Monument) and faced North Northwest.
