After running several random lines from the established R.R. property in the above named town I was able to locate the N.E. Cor. of Block 11 of the vacated town of Dillard. I estab. this cor. with an iron pin and run S. 83°-29' W. 214.0 ft. to N.W. Cor. of Block, thence S. 05°-44' E. 100.0 ft to S.W. cor. of Parcel of land, thence N. 83°-29' E. 214.0 ft. to S.E. Cor. of parcel of land, thence N. 05°-44' W. 100.0 ft. to place of begin. The S.E. Cor. of the parcel of land is tied to the sec. cor. for secs. 28, 29, 32 & 33 as follow.

"Said S.E. Cor. brs. N. 60°-31' W. 1255.04 ft, dist"

The above described piece of land was divided into 3 lots the descriptions of which are found in the "Miscellaneous Deed Description" Envelope

Each lot is marked with one metal corner and yew hubs for other corner stakes

Began sur. at the M.C. post on the South Bank of the Umpqua River on the sec. line bet. secs. 35 & 36 above township and range. One old M.C.

Feet "B^oT" is still in evidence and marking legible. I project the line due North from this M.C. post and at

6348.62 I intersect Cl. of the W.P.R.R. at R.R. Sta. 2424+59.0. I cont. line on North, and at

737.14 I set in Iron Crow bar, for S.E. Cor. of land to be described. From this bar I turn and run my line due

West, and at

103.65 I set in iron pipe, from this pipe I make up my description by legal subdivisions.

The line N. from the M.C. post is supposed to be on the section line bet. secs 25 & 26 but as all evidence of this line has been destroyed by time and the W.P.R.R. Co. the supposition may be an correct.
